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

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Commissioners cover light agenda

Allen County Commissioners met Tuesday, April 12, at 8:30 a.m., in the assembly room of the Allen County Courthouse.

Chairman Jerry Daniels called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m., with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Daniels then opened the floor to receive public comment. Hearing none, commissioners called on public works director Mitch Garner to give his weekly report.

Garner presented commissioners with bids he had received to purchase a truckmounted snow plow for the Allen County Airport.

After brief discussion, commissioners approved the bid from Mynatt Truck and Equipment, for \$4,700 to have the brackets installed and a removable seven foot snow plow fitted.

Garner also reported that his crews were busy finishing up some work at the storm shelter sites.

Commissioners met with Jason Trego, who reported that severe weather was in the forecast, possibly for later in the afternoon, and more certainly later in the night.

Trego also reported that the most severe weather was projected to pass just north, and stated they could see very large hail, wind gusts in excess of 70 miles per hour, and even the potential of tornadoes.

Trego stated that weather predicted for later tonight was more certain, and that they could expect hail, and wind gusts upwards of 60 miles per hour,

with the possibility of a tornado then as well.

Daniels asked Trego if he had updated the maps of storm shelter locations to include the new shelters.

Trego responded that he was working on it, and that they would all be added to the map.

Commissioners met with Jonathon Goering, Thrive Allen County, who reported that they should have word from the Federal Aviation Administration on funding for the county's airport layout plan.

Goering also reported that he had a conversation with Trego, about an opportunity the county airport has to become a firefighting hub for southeast Kansas.

This is a program through the Kansas Department of Emergency Management, Tanker 95, a tanker plane, based out of Hutchinson, that is used to fight fires across the state.

Goering did note that a fire hydrant would need to be present at the airport to be able to fill the tanker.

Goering stated that the airport was a good location to serve southeast Kansas, and met other qualifications as well.

Commissioners met with Jessica Thompson, also with Thrive Allen County. Thompson reported that they had received a small donation of around \$2,500 for the storm shelters.

She reported that it would take Thrive a little time to process the check as their chief financial officer is currently out on medical leave.

Thompson also requested commissioners sign a letter of

support for a grant Thrive is pursuing for maintenance at the Lehigh walking trails.

Commissioners motioned for the chairman's signature on the letter of support.

Commissioners motioned to sign an agreement for services with Tri-Valley Developmental Services.

Commissioners motioned for ten minutes of executive session for non-elected personnel, to include 911 director Chelsie Angleton, county counselor Bob Johnson, and county clerk Sherrie Riebel.

Commissioners motioned for five minutes of non-elected personnel to include counselor Johnson.

Commissioners motioned for an additional ten minutes of executive session, with counselor Johnson.

With no further business, commissioners motioned to adjourn until their next regular meeting Tuesday, April 19, at 8:30 a.m. in the assembly room of the Allen County Courthouse.
